We as a congregation have enjoyed a good year. The highlight of the year was the observance of the ninetieth anniversary of the founding of the Parish with our special guest the Right Reverend L.S. Garnsworthy, Suffragan Bishop of Toronto. On this occasion it was our pleasure to welcome back many former parishioners. Especially may I say how good it was to welcome members of the family of the Reverend R. MacNamara, one of our earlier Rectors.

Once again we shared joint services in the summer with our good neighbors of St. Paul's, Runnymede.

I sincerely want to thank the members of the congregation for their excellent response to our Stewardship Campaign. Your loyalty and support in this regard is an encouragement to us all.

We continue to take services at Runnymede Hospital on the third Sunday of each month. May I express my grateful thanks to the volunteers who give of their time so generously. These are Miss Edna Thompson, Miss Georgina Taylor, Miss Ida Brittain, Miss Eunice Noble, Miss Cheryl Pronyk, Mrs. J. Buschlen, Mrs. Crowther, Mrs. Poole, and Mr. and Mrs. A. Gandy. Following a long-standing tradition, our choirs visited the hospital at Christmas and the Married Couples' Club generously supplied gifts for the Christmas Tree.

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#### STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

We are pleased to report that the Commitments for 1972 total \$28,200.; this figure being a slight improvement over last year.

34% of our envelope users increased their commitment by \$2,418. but this was offset by a reduction in the number from 185 to 146, due mainly to removals from the Parish, deaths in the congregation and reduced commitments. These latter factors reflect the changing pattern of our congregation and is an ever present source of concern to the Rector and Wardens - and indeed to all of us.

At the present time, only 57% of our people are using envelopes and to the remaining 43% who do not use this method of regularly supporting our Church, we respectfully suggest that you give serious thought and prayer to this aspect of your Worship.

#### CHURCH PROPERTIES

During 1971 necessary repairs to the plumbing and heating systems; the drainage system and some minor electrical repairs were required to keep our properties functioning. These have all been made along with some minor repairs to the structure of the buildings. We must bear in mind that our Church is nearly 50 years old, the Rectory over 50 years and the Parish House about 75 years.

Considerable work will need to be done to maintain these during 1972. Plastering, painting, and some carpentry is urgently needed.

Cement work on the Church driveway and replacement of tile in the Parish Hall will be done this Spring.

### CHURCH WARDENS! REPORT

The last year began with reduced receipts, unforseen expense and near calamity. The heating system in the Parish House failed and required emergency work. The Day Nursery enrolment fell and their donations were reduced accordingly. In April we were unable to prepay our annual insurance as required and were forced to with-hold our payments to Outreach. The long term planning committee was meeting to consider possible alternatives open to St. John's in the future. Hope of renting our facilities appeared negligible. Our attempts to rent the upper apartment in the Parish House failed. Through-out the spring and summer the Wardens were forced to take a very conservative stance with regard to spending (particularly in the area of badly needed renovations).

In the fall the financial situation looked much brighter. Weight Watchers of Ontario started using our hall once a week and gave us a monthly donation. The Day Nursery reached capacity enrolment and people began bringing their envelopes up to date. We received \$9,000. of the pledged \$27,000. during November and December. As a result of reduced spending and late receipts we enter 1972 with a comfortable bank balance which will enable us to pay our insurance and Outreach payments on time and permit extensive renovation next summer.

In 1971 St. John's undertook to simplify the envelope system. The triplicate envelope was replaced by a single envelope and the blue renovation and brown Outreach envelopes were abandoned. In order not to jeopardize the new single envelope no special appeals were made as had been made for renovation, Outreach and debt reduction in recent years. Although receipts from special appeals are understandably down, the single envelope receipts follow the pattern of recent years.

The Wardens would like to extend their thanks to the salaried staff and in particular Jim Leonard and the Rev. Maurice Poole who have been most co-operative in trimming their programme because of the spring financial situation. We would like to thank the Thompsons, who were forced to retire from their posts this fall; Philip Poole, who has had to give up the Junior Choir (founded by him); and Jim Goodfellow, who has acted as Treasurer since September, for their devotion to their offices and for their efforts im making the transfer of their offices as smooth as possible. We would like to extend our appreciation to those who accepted the vacated offices, namely: Ruth Shortt, Envelope Secretary; Jack Lawson, Treasurer; and Lenore Leonard, Junior Choir Leader. In addition there are the numerous volunteers without whose talents St. John's would cease to function. The Shortts and Munroes have done an exceptional job of promoting the new Hymn Book. Frank Munroe and Jack Lawson led a Stewardship Campaign without which 1972 would not look so promising. We would like to thank the A.C.V. for their continued support and particularly Mona Johnston for her aggressive leadership.

1972 promises to be a year of decision and commitment. In the fall St. John's appealed to Synod for a reduction in our assessment (a tax toward central office expenditures) in order that we could afford to take a larger share in mission work (Outreach). Synod granted our request and we are commiting ourselves to the Outreach Target of \$3,890. a sum within our means for the first time in over a decade.

In the late spring of 1972 a special Vestry will be called to decide which of many alternatives St. John's will choose for the future. It is evident that our income is decreasing each year and we cannot maintain our present programme and buildings indefinitely. The long term planning committee will present a written report to every parishioner and the parishioners will have an opportunity to express their opinions at the special Vestry. The decision of that meeting will enable St. John's to move forward with determination and confidence into the future.
